#### 1. Principal's Report



**Sarojini Naidu Government Girls Postgraduate (Autonomous) College,** popularly known as **'Nutan College',** is one of the premier institutes of the state for quality education to the women. Since its inception in 1970, college has achieved considerable heights in academic excellence and extracurricular perfection. Last year college celebrated its 50<sup>th</sup> year of commencement.

The College aims to empower young women and prepare them for a dynamic and responsible role in the society.

The College has been awarded 'A' Grade in 2017 with 3.09 points by NAAC in cycle III of Re-accreditation. After fourth review of Autonomy in 2019 further extension has been granted by UGC. Currently the College has 6048 students enrolled in various disciplines. College has 5 faculties Arts, Commerce, Science, Home Science and Computer Application which offer Under Graduate and Postgraduate courses. Besides, 17 self-financing courses are also being conducted by various departments. M.Phil program is being run by the department of History, Economics and Sociology. The college is Research Center for Ph.D. in 17 subjects. We are proud to achieve 99 % result in UG and PG Classes in this session. In extracurricular section, we have been honored by the participation of one of the students Miss Deepika Upadhyay in the international Taekwondo event. Apart from her, seven students have participated in national events of various sports winning five gold, and two bronze, four students participated at state level sports events and brought two gold, one silver and one bronze. Students have keenly participated in NCC and NSS activities and represented at State and National level.

The Academia-Industry interface Program has been conducted under MPHEQIP to provide industry exposure to the students and give them opportunity to interact with the industrialists and to understand the challenges faced by them. The program was intended to benefit the young learners to know beforehand the needs of the industry, market trends, emerging business models and cost efficient production ideas.

The college has 101 highly qualified regular academic staff and 34 guest faculties. We are honoured to have 4 Professor with D.Litt. in our faculty. Dr Shashi Kiran Nayak has been awarded "Nari Ratn Shiksha Samman" by the "Vishwa Hindi Lekhika Sangh" in March, 2021. Dr. Manisha Sharma has been honoured by District Legal Service Authority for her service to create awareness among students about legal process etc through legal aid clinic. Dr Sanjay Sahay, Professor of Botany has been granted two patents in the field of Bioethanol. He has



served as reviewer for a very reputed Springer's Research Journal "Journal of Genetics". He has also edited two international books "Handbook of Biofuels" published by Elsevier and "Extremophilic Fungi: Ecology, Physiology and biotechnology" published by Springer. Dr Santosh Yadav, Professor of Commerce has also edited a book on "World Trade after COVID-19" published by Writers Choice Publications Pvt. Ltd.

Prof. Sanjay Sahay has served as focal point for benchmarking of 24 Government Colleges with World Bank Team. Prof. Ranjana Trivedi, Prof. Ruchira Choudhary and Prof. Seema Hardikar have been serving as coordinator, and Prof. Kusum Mathur, Dr Manisha Sharma and Dr. Deepti Sankat as co-coordinator of e-content development and validation team of MP Higher Education Department. Dr Kusum Mathur and Dr Manisha Sharma have also been serving as NAAC master facilitator of MP Higher Education department for eight Government Colleges.

The college has been selected to fund for Academic and Infrastructure Development under MPHEQIP and RUSA (MHRD) and the projects are on completion successfully.

Under the aegis of Swami Vivekanand Career Guidance Cell, various training programs and placements sessions were organized. As a result 68 students were selected for placement with a package of upto 3.5 Lac per annum.

To address the issues related to student support and progression Tutor-Guardian Scheme is working effectively in which each teacher is allotted 30-50 students to mentor. Other Committees like Grievance Redressal Cell, Anti-Ragging Committee, Student Advisory Committee and Sexual Harassment Redressal Cell are dealing with student's issues and needs. To enhance students' participation, each committee has been ensured to include two students as well.

The College library has been shifted in huge three-floored building during this session with its excellent collection of more than 65000 books. It does provide Inflib NET and DelNET facilities.

To promote standard in research, networking, linkages and collaborations with other organizations have been done which resulted in several MoUs. At present there are 34 Research Scholars registered in different subjects. There are about 25 research publications in peer reviewed journals.

This year, to advice on various legal issues to the students a LEGAL AID CLINIC has been launched in collaboration with the District Legal Service Authority (DLSA) and State Legal Service Authority (SLSA) on 29.06.21 for the cause of Access to Justice to All. The college aims at overall development of its students and prepares them as responsible citizens of the country.

The College lays due emphasis on the upkeep of infrastructure facilities. It has a maintenance committee that takes care of periodical maintenance and repairs. The College engages the services of carpenters, electricians, plumbers, gardeners and sanitaryworkers to maintain the furniture, electric appliances, water supplies, garden and cleanliness of the campus. #### Wheeling to the Grid

Excess (surplus) solar energy generated by rooftop solar modules is exported to the grid of

• electricity distribution utility of Azure Power Roof Top Five Pvt Ltd. From where it is transferred to MPEB from where direct saving in electrical bills are available on monthly basis.

#### 1. Sensor-based energy conservation

• The overhead storage tanks are provided with sensors/alarm to prevent overflow during lifting of water from the sump well by the motors. Thus helps in reducing the consumption of energy.

#### 2. Use of LED bulbs/ power-efficient equipment

- The institute has already implemented various measures regarding conservation /alternative use of energy viz. using LED bulbs and power efficient equipment, solar panels etc.
- Strict instruction to switch off the electric equipments after use.
- Glass windows in the classroom facilitate the maximum utilization of natural light.

#### 1. Solid waste management

- The college encourages the process of eco friendly waste disposal method.
- In the common areas there are single bins kept, the bins are using black liners for waste collection.
- Maximum waste generated is recycled and reused
- The reduction of paper waste because by implementing paperless policies we were able to: save money, reduce waste.
- all housekeeping staffs are trained to segregate waste at source before the waste is dumped for disposal
- The college also generates a huge amount of Garden waste which is mostly in the form of leaves which is deposited in separate chamber and composted to form manure and used for organic farming
- The other paper wastes are sent out through our regular scarp vendors.

#### 2. Liquid waste management

- The waste chemicals mixed water from laboratory passes through concealed pipe line into soak pit.
- Liquids are diluted by getting mixed with the washroom and toilet liquid wastes in to the
- common drainage.

#### 3. E-waste management

- The E-waste collected is stored in a box and disposed accordingly.
- The Empty toners, cartridges, outdated computers and electronic items are sold as scrap to ensure their safe recycling.
- Old monitors and CPUs are repaired by our technician and reused. (Yadav sir will send the answers)

#### 4. Hazardous chemicals and radioactive waste management

There is zero radioactive waste from the collage there are no hazardous chemical waste only diluted acid and alkalis are generated from chemistry lab. Which are collected in a tank though drain pipes. Every month this liquid waste will be tested, neutralized and then will be mixed to the main drain.

Under smart city project Modular rain water recharge system was set up to use rain water for the utilization of institute.
