# 1. Principal's Report

#### वार्षिक प्रतिवेदन

हरितिमा और पुष्पों से सुसज्जित मार्ग एवं झीलों की नगरी मध्यप्रदेश के हृदयस्थल में स्थित यह महाविद्यालय प्रदेश की छात्राओं के लिये सदैव आर्कषण का केन्द्र रहा है।सरोजिनी नायडू शासकीय कन्या स्नातकोत्तर स्वशासी महाविद्यालय, भोपाल की स्थापना जुलाई 1970 में हुई। सन् 1996 में स्वशासी घोषित यह महाविद्यालय विगत 21 वर्षों से स्वशासी है। मार्च 2017 में नेक के द्वारा महाविद्यालय को 'A' ग्रेड प्राप्त हो चुका है। ऐसे महाविद्यालय में माननीय अतिथियों का स्वागत, अभिनंदन करते हुए हमें गौरव महसूस हो रहा है।

प्रवेश, अध्यापन एवं परीक्षा परिणाम- महाविद्यालय में लगभग 4500 छात्राएँ अध्ययनरत हैं, जिनमे वर्ष 2017-18 स्नातक प्रथम वर्ष में प्रवेशित कुल छात्राओं - 1344 का लगभग 34.4%अर्थात् 463 छात्राएँ मेधावी छात्राएँ हैं। महाविद्यालय में कला, वाणिज्य, गृहविज्ञान, कम्प्यूटर एप्लीकेशन, पुस्तकालय विज्ञान में स्नातक एवं 21 विषयों मे स्नातकोत्तर पाठ्यक्रम संचालित हैं एवं 17 स्ववित्तीय पाठ्यक्रम संचालित है। वर्ष 2017-18 में महाविद्यालय का परीक्षा परिणाम 93.6 प्रतिशत रहा। महाविद्यालय में 107 नियमित शैक्षणिक स्टॉफ एवं 25 अतिथि विद्वान छात्राओं के शैक्षणिक एवं शैक्षणेतर विकास के लिये कृतसंकल्प है। इनमें चार प्राध्यापक डी.लिट. हैं।

**छात्रसंघ चुनाव -** सत्र 2017-18 के छात्रसंघ निर्वाचन में 25 छात्राएँ निर्विरोध चुनी गई एवं निर्वाचन मनोनयन सहित 76 कक्षा प्रतिनिधि बने। उत्साहपूर्ण वातावरण में छात्रसंघ पदाधिकारियों का चुनाव सम्पन्न हुआ।

शासन की हितग्राही योजनाएं- शासन की विभिन्न हितग्राही योजनाओं का लाभ महाविद्यालय की छात्राएँ प्राप्त कर रही हैं। अनुसूचित जाति एवं जनजाति की छात्राओं के लिए रेमेडियल कक्षाएँ, नेट तथा पी.एस.सी.के लिए कोचिंग कक्षाएँ संचालित की जा रही हैं। शिक्षक अभिभावक योजना के अंतर्गत प्रत्येक सहा./सह./प्राध्यापक को 30 छात्राएँ आवंटित की गई हैं। स्मार्टफोन वितरण का कार्य महाविद्यालय में सफलतापूर्वक सम्पन्न किया गया। वर्ष 2014-15 में प्रवेशित छात्राओं को 903, सत्र 2015-16 में प्रवेशित छात्राओं को 1020 एवं 2016-17 में प्रवेशित छात्राओं को 1017 स्मार्टफोन वितरित किये गये। प्रक्रिया अभी जारी है। महाविद्यालय की 02 छात्राओं को माननीय मुख्यमंत्री जी के हाथों स्मार्टफोन प्राप्त करने का सौभाग्य प्राप्त हुआ।

अनुशासन व्यवस्था- महाविद्यालय की गतिविधियों का संचालन विभिन्न समितियों द्वारा किया जाता है। महाविद्यालय में अनुशासन समिति, एंटी रेगिंग समिति तथा यौन उत्पीड़न निवारण समिति का गठन किया गया है। समितियों के सदस्यों एवं स्वयं मेरे द्वारा सतत् निगरानी की जाती है। यह संतोष का विषय है कि इस महाविद्यालय में रेगिंग अथवा यौन उत्पीड़न का कोई भी केस दर्ज नहीं हुआ है।

उपलब्ध संसाधन - महाविद्यालय में परम्परागत संसाधनों के साथ-साथ समृद्ध पुस्तकालय है जिसमें विभिन्न विषयों की लगभग 65 हजार पुस्तके हैं। छात्राओं के लिए यू.जी.सी. की इनिएलब नेट और डेल नेट की सुविधा उपलब्ध है। महाविद्यालय में ई-जर्नल निकाला जाता है। उल्लेखनीय है कि महाविद्यालय में 2004-05 में डिसेबिल यूनिट की स्थापना की गई। शासन के वेब कटेंट असेसेबिलिटि के निर्देषों को ध्यान में रखते हुए इसे डिसेबिल फ्रेंडली(निशक्त जन मित्र) भी बनाया गया है, दृष्टि बाधित टेक्स्ट टू स्पीच स्क्रीन रीडिंड सॉफ्ट वेयर का उपयोग कर जानकारी प्राप्त कर सकते हैं। महाविद्यालय का अपना छात्रावास है, जहाँ वर्तमान में लगभग 120 छात्राएँ रहती हैं। छात्रावास छात्राओं को स्र्रिक्षत एवं आदर्श वातावरण प्रदान करता है। महाविद्यालय में सर्वसुविधा एवं पौष्टिक सामग्री से युक्त केंटीन भी संचालित है।

यू.जी.सी.- यू.जी.सी. की बारहवीं योजना में प्राप्त राशि 3780,000/- का उपयोग महाविद्यालय के विकास हेतु विभिन्न मदों में किया गया। यू.जी.सी. से Sports Facility and equipment के अंतर्गत प्राप्त राशि 1,10,00,000/- का उपयोग Indoor, Outdoor, Sports/Facilities के लिये किया गया। 90%राशि का उपयोग किया जा चुका हैं। निर्माण कार्य प्रचलन में हैं जिसकी इस वर्ष पूर्ण होने की संभावना हैं। विश्वविद्यालय अनुदान आयोग से स्वशासी अनुदान 2017-18 की प्रत्याशा में विभिन्न मदों जैसे विकास तथा अकादिमक मदों में राशि 20,00,000/- छात्राओं एवं महाविद्यालय के हित में व्यय की जा रही है।

राष्ट्रीय सेवा योजना - राष्ट्रीय सेवा योजना की दो इकाइयाँ महाविद्यालय में संचालित हैं, जिनमें 250 स्वयंसेवक पंजीकृत हैं। जिन्होंने डिजिटल इण्डिया, कैशलैस ट्रांजेक्शन, स्वच्छ भारत, मतदाता जागरूकता, सड़क सुरक्षा सप्ताह आदि गतिविधियों में उत्साहपूर्वक भाग लिया। जिला स्तरीय नेतृत्व प्रशिक्षण शिविर में महाविद्यालय की छात्रा मोनिका कौरव ने दलनायक का दायित्व निभाया एवं राज्य स्तरीय नेतृत्व प्रशिक्षण शिविर ग्राम महान्द्रा जिला सागर में महाविद्यालय की तीन छात्राओं ने भाग लिया। आत्मरक्षा प्रशिक्षण की 'ट्रेनिंग एज टेनर' में कु. आशी मालवीय, अनुजा दीक्षित एवं सुरिभ राठौर ने 30 दिवसीय प्रशिक्षण प्राप्त किया एवं महाविद्यालय की 60 छात्राओं को प्रशिक्षित किया। विशेष शिविर के दौरान ग्राम सुखी सेवनियाँ की 54 किशोरी बालिकाओं को भी प्रशिक्षित किया। NSS टीम ने डिजिटल इण्डिया क्विज में प्रथम स्थान प्राप्त किया तथा कुमारी रंजना चौहान ने प्री आर.डी.सी. शिविर में प्रदेश का प्रतिनिधित्व किया।

नेशनल केडिट कोर - एन.सी.सी. के अंतर्गत महाविद्यालय की छात्रा सीनियर अण्डर ऑफीसर गुजंन भसीन को नेशनल रिपब्लिक डे केम्प एवं पीएम रैली नई दिल्ली में भाग लेने का अवसर प्राप्त हुआ। सीनियर अण्डर ऑफीसर पूजा भाटी ने अण्डमान निकोबार में नेशनल स्पेशल इंटीग्रेशन केम्प में भाग लिया एवं प्रथम तीन में अपनी जगह बनाई। अण्डर ऑफीसर दीक्षा गुप्ता ने पीएम रैली में भाग लिया तथा नेशनल स्पोर्ट्स, नई दिल्ली में हेण्ड बॉल टीम सदस्य के रूप में भाग लिया, टीम ने वहां द्वितीय स्थान प्राप्त किया। महाविद्यालय की एक और अण्डर ऑफीसर

दीक्षा गुप्ता ने नेशनल स्पोर्ट्स, पश्चिम बंगाल में शूटिंग में भाग लिया एवं नेशनल इंटीग्रेशन केम्प, मैहर में भागीदारी की। 15 अगस्त एवं 26 जनवरी को लाल परेड ग्राउण्ड में 4 एम.पी.गर्ल्स बटालियन ने प्रथम पुरस्कार प्राप्त किया, जिसमें क्रमशः 50 एवं 25 केडेट्स थे।

खेल गितिविधयाँ - महाविद्यालय का गौरव बढ़ाने में हमारे खिलाड़ियों ने महत्वपूर्ण भूमिका अदा की है। विभिन्न खेल गितविधियों में छात्राओं ने राष्ट्रीय एवं अन्तर्राष्ट्रीय स्तर पर भागीदारी की एवं महत्वपूर्ण स्थान प्राप्त किए। अमृता पटनायक ने लाँगजम्प, रिचा शर्मा, सिमी जैन, अर्पिता परमार ने बॉलीबॉल, मुस्कान अडवानी ने तैराकी, आयुषी वर्मा, शिवानी रैकवार, श्वेता वर्मा ने बास्केट बॉल, शालिनी सिंह एवं शिवानी राजपूत ने फुटबॉट, श्रेया गुप्ता ने बॉक्सिंग, वर्षा पाल एवं मुस्कान शुक्ला ने शतरंज में राष्ट्रीय स्तर पर प्रतिनिधित्व किया। जूड़ो में समीक्षा बड़कुर एवं निकिता कुशवाह ने शिलाँग में राष्ट्रीय स्तर पर कांस्य पदक प्राप्त किया। नीतू बरदहे ने कश्मीर में ताइकाँडों में राष्ट्रीय स्तर पर स्वर्ण पदक प्राप्त किया। अंतर्राष्ट्रीय स्तर पर सरिता तोमर ने रशिया में कांस्य एवं अंजिल शर्मा ने स्वर्ण पदक प्राप्त किया। छात्राओं की राष्ट्रीय एवं अंतर्राष्ट्रीय फलक पर भागीदारी एंव जीत महाविद्यालय के लिये गर्व एवं छात्राओं के लिये प्रेरणा का विषय है।

युवा उत्सव - युवा उत्सव के अंतर्गत वकृता प्रतियोगिता में स्वाति बरदिया ने विश्वविद्यालय में प्रथम स्थान प्राप्त किया एवं समूहगान में महाविद्यालय की छात्राओं ने राज्य में प्रथम स्थान प्राप्त किया।

शोध कार्य- सत्र 2016-17 एवं 2017-18 में 34 शोधार्थियों ने शोध कार्य हेतु इस महाविद्यालय में पंजीयन कराया हैं।यू.जी.सी. के अंतर्गत बारहवीं योजना में महाविद्यालय में 7 माइनर प्रोजेक्ट्स पर प्राध्यापकों ने शोधकार्य सम्पन्न किया। हिन्दी विभाग के प्राध्यापक डॉ. लिलता त्रिपाठी ने विद्यार्थियों द्वारा आन्तरिक मूल्यांकन के अंतर्गत हिन्दी साहित्य पाठ्यक्रम के अधिकांश अंश पर लगभग 100C.D. तैयार करवाई हैं। भविष्य में हिन्दी साहित्य के पाठ्यक्रम के दृश्य-श्रव्य अध्ययन - अध्यापन हेतु इस कार्य की महत्वपूर्ण भूमिका सुनिश्चित हैं। समाजशास्त्र विभाग की छात्रा परिधि ने नेट एवं JRF स्कॉरिशप क्वालिफाई किया।

परामर्श, मार्गदर्शन, प्रशिक्षण एवं प्लेसमेंट-छात्राओं को प्राध्यापकों एवं विषय विषेषज्ञों द्वारा व्यक्तित्व विकास, कौशल विकास एवं अन्य विषयों में रोजगार प्रशिक्षण एवं अवसरों की जानकारी दी जाती है। महाविद्यालय द्वारा विभिन्न संस्थानों के साथ एम.ओ.यू.किया गया। ये मध्यप्रदेश के उच्चस्तरीय वैज्ञानिक व शोध संस्थान हैं। इन संस्थानों के सहयोग से एवं अन्य विशेषज्ञों के सहयोग एवं मार्गदर्शन में महाविद्यालय में छात्राओं को रोजगारोन्मुखी अल्पकालीन प्रषिक्षण प्रदान किया गया। स्वामी विवेकानंद केरियर मार्ग दर्शन प्रकोष्ठ द्वारा इस सत्र में अब तक 21 दिवसीय 07 प्रशिक्षण कार्यक्रम आयोजित किये गये है। महाविद्यालय में 03 दिवसीय उद्यमिता जागरूकता शिविर लगाया गया, जिसके माध्यम से लोन प्राप्त करने एवं स्वयं का व्यवसाय प्रारंभ करने हेतु मार्गदर्शन दिया गया।

महाविद्यालय की 03 छात्राओं ने TCS प्लेसमेंट हेतु कंसेन्ट्रीक, मन्थनमेनिया में कैम्पस प्लेसमेंट पाया। टाइम्स प्रो. सेफ एक्सप्रेस आदि कम्पनियों को प्लेसमेंट हेतु इसी माह आमंत्रित किया गया है। भविष्य में अन्य कम्पनियों के आमंत्रण प्रस्तावित हैं। सत्र 2016-17 में महाविद्यालय की 379 छात्राओं को विभिन्न कम्पनियों में प्लेसमेंट मिला। अन्य महाविद्यालयों के विद्यार्थियों के लिए ओपन कैंपस एवं भव्य केरियर मेले का आयोजन किया गया। यू.जी.सी. द्वारा प्रायोजित हिन्दी विभाग द्वारा सामर्थ उन्नयन कार्यक्रम के अन्तर्गत 10 दिवसीय व्याख्यान माला आयोजित की गई जिसमें 'प्रतियोगी परीक्षाओं हेतु हिन्दी की तैयारी' विषय पर विषय विशेषज्ञों ने रोचक एवं ज्ञानवर्धक व्याख्यान दिए। यू.जी.सी. द्वारा प्रायोजित आई.टी. प्रकोष्ठ द्वारा "SPSS essentials" की छः दिवसीय कार्यशाला आयोजित की गई जिसमें राष्ट्रीय स्तर पर 40 प्रतिभागियों ने भाग लिया। भारत सरकार द्वारा आई.आई.टी. मुम्बई की स्पोकन टिटोरियल में इस प्रकोष्ठ द्वारा सभी संकायों की 385 छात्राओं को ऑनलाईन ट्रेनिंग प्रदान की गई। वनस्पतिशास्त्र विभाग द्वारा एम.पी.कॉन भोपाल के सहयोग से 03 दिवसीय आंवला प्रसंस्करण एवं मार्केटिंग पर प्रशिक्षण कार्यक्रम आयोजित किया गया जिसमें लगभग 75 छात्राओं एवं 22 प्राध्यापकों ने प्रशिक्षण प्राप्त किया। डिसेबल प्रकोष्ठ द्वारा महाविद्यालय के प्राध्यापकों के लिए संकेत भाषा प्रशिक्षण कार्यक्रम में 54 प्राध्यापकों ने प्रशिक्षण प्राप्त किया। गृहविज्ञान विभाग द्वारा प्रतिवर्ष आहार एवं पोषण सप्ताह का आयोजन छात्राओं के ज्ञानवर्धन के लिए किया जाता है।



# 16. Looking ahead (3 pages) Future Plans

### Augmentation of Infrastructure:

- Looking at the incremental growth in numbers of students, beginning of new courses and lack of sufficient working space for teaching & non-teaching staff, there is a need of augmentation in the present infrastructure.
- The College is constructed up to G+1 level and hence there is a leeway for vertical expansion.
- As per budget estimates provided by Project Implementation Unit of Public Works Department, 16 Rooms and 02 Washrooms can be erected for Rs. 3.0 crores.
- This would alleviate student access from 2019-20 till to 2022-23 by 3% every year.

### Upgradation of Research facilities in Campus.

- The College is a Research Center for students pursuing their doctoral research in 17 subjects. However, the scholars have to compromise with the quality of research owing to lack of sophisticated tools and equipment. Despite 500+ publications, made by the faculty and students, during the last five years, publications in standard journals are almost negligible.
- The College has a string of potential philosophers, who can transform their ideas into a coherent research, if provided with proper research amenities. The research facilities will stimulate graduates and post graduate students also, to undertake innovation and research assignments which will help them in their vertical mobility.
- The College plans to procure computers & equipment, subscribe e-library resources, reference books & journals, initiate publication of in-house research journals by the respective departments, knowledge sharing through seminars, conferences, symposia, industry-academia interactions etc.
- As per the budget approximation received from various academic departments and working units of the College, a total pay-out of Rs. 4,80,00,000.00 would be required.

- This would enhance the Transition Rate from 2019 till 2023 by 3% every year; with corresponding increase in On time graduation rate from 2019 batch students passing out in 2022 by 2% every year.
- This would further add to research publication from 2019 till 2023 by 5% every year with consequent improvement in citation index, h-index, i-10 index and impact factor.

#### Skill Enhancement

- A common state of affairs is that students, who bear knowledge lack adequate skills and those who possess skills are often deprived of knowledge.
- The College envisages to equip our inmates with knowledge as well as skills, and to have this, the College plans to conduct:
  - Survey, Tours & Field Works
  - Training Programs
  - Workshops
  - \* Faculty Development programs.
  - ♣ Short-term/Certificate Courses.
  - Guest Lectures
- This would incur an expenditure of Rs. 2,20,00,000.00.
- This plan would help in increasing Vertical mobility from (UG to PG to M.Phil. to Ph.D. and so on) from 2019 till 2023 by 2% every year.
- This would also raise the likelihood of employability from 2019 till 2023 by 2% every year.
